As long-time University of Delaware and Master Player Concert Series (MPCS) supporters we were thrilled when we were finally able to travel with Professor Sean Gao on the UD Alumni & Friends 2024 trip to China. We are appreciative of the support that the University continues to provide for this adventurous cultural exchange.

Many years ago (now) retired UD Professor Pat Tanner Nelson strongly encouraged Kris to be sure to hear violinist Xiang Gao. We (one-time violist and trumpeter) did and were enthralled. Through the MPCS performances we got to "know" Sean as the MPCS director and host, oft-time violinist, and 6-WIRE ensemblist. We knew he was cool under pressure. Who wouldn't want to travel with him?

Having the trip planned and led by bilingual / bicultural educator(s) Sean (and Renée Dong) made all the difference. We thoroughly enjoyed the many beautiful historic cities, sites, and museums, but perhaps even more valuable were the cultural experiences, planned and impromptu, seeing everyday life unfold – and living it whenever possible. (Sean made this a priority.) These experiences included but were not limited to the following.

- We visited a fascinating grocery store with a wide array of familiar and unfamiliar baked goods, fresh and dried fish and meats, fresh fruits, and vegetables. Among the most unusual was a display of live silk pupae.
- We visited street vendors in Beijing, Xi'An, Shanghai and Suzhou selling everything from antiques to squid.
- We participated in a tea ceremony.
- We learned about the cultivation of silkworms, spinning and weaving silk.
- We observed everyday life within the Hutong neighborhood of Beijing (via rickshaw and walking tours) and along the canals on our boat ride in Suzhou.
- We visited with a family living in the Hutong (courtyard neighborhood) in a multigenerational home.

- We watched expert embroiderers and weavers create masterpieces large and small.
- We walked the Shanghai Restricted Sector for Stateless Refugees (Shanghai Ghetto) with a Jewish history expert and toured the Shanghai Jewish Refugees Museum with its director learning about the refugees' life in occupied China.
- We appreciated the good humor of our Beijing, Xi'An and Shanghai/Suzhou guides and learned a bit about their lives.
- We visited with children, teens and adults who wanted to share their thoughts and practice their English. Including well-informed folks who knew Biden was from Delaware!
- We were welcomed to the lovely Beijing apartment of retired meteorologists the Dongs (Renée's parents).
- We encountered young and old dressed in exquisite traditional garb and everyday clothes who were happy to pose for photos including a smiling grandmother in a long embroidered red dress, head piece and fan in the Forbidden City, a sweet mother and daughter pair in matching long pink beaded dresses and flowered head pieces at the Summer Palace, a young women in a Mosque wearing a lovely cream and blue outfit flashing a peace sign as she posed with a bamboo cage containing a seemingly contented dove, a father and daughter on a motorbike and so many more at museums, gardens and markets.

We have been home for two weeks from the U of D Master Players 2024 trip to China. Every day we think of another memorable moment from this trip of a lifetime. Any preconceived ideas about what China would be like were shattered. The cities we visited amazed us in the use of architecture and technology, creating amazingly modern urban areas. While building for the future, so much of the ancient, historic culture was simultaneously engrained in the newness, allowing China to look toward to the future while remembering its past. The Chinese we meet were very welcoming and wanted to make sure we enjoyed our visit to their country.

What made the trip so enjoyable and educational was your unique leadership, planning and commentary as our tour leader.
